TODDLERS



It's the start of another exciting half-term in **Toddlers**. Our new learning journey on Fairy Tales began with The Three Little Pigs and a fun Halloween celebration! In Understanding the World, children explored different building materials used by the pigs and compared them to real materials like bricks and wood during a nature walk. They even used palm leaves to make a roof in the sand area! Through Art, Craft and Role-play, the little ones created pig masks, built a small shed and acted out scenes from the story — imagining themselves as the pig who built a house of straw. Halloween added extra excitement as they dressed up in costumes and scooped out pumpkin seeds to make a glowing Jack-o'-lantern. In Numeracy, the children built towers with wooden blocks while singing number rhymes, strengthening both coordination and counting skills. In Literacy, the focus was on the memorable line, "I'll huff, I'll puff and I'll blow your house down!" and tested which materials could withstand the "wolf's" mighty breath. What a fun way of learning through this timeless fairy tale!

PLAYGROUP

The **Playgroup** class has been joyfully exploring the theme of celebration, and a major highlight was our Halloween festivities! The children arrived in their spooky costumes, ready for a day filled with fun and laughter.

During circle time, we sang "Pumpkin Patch" and learnt about autumn, pumpkins and the excitement of carving them. The class also enjoyed a lively trick-or-treat game that brought lots of giggles!

For physical development, pupils rolled pumpkins to one another and scooped out pumpkin seeds during construction time — a wonderful exercise in coordination and teamwork. In numeracy, they counted seeds and traced numbers while adding a playful twist by clapping softly like raindrops. Through PSED, the children explored emotions, learning that there are no real monsters and talked about how to be brave. They also practised identifying their belongings and engaged in role-play, acting out fun family activities.

To wrap up, our little artists created colourful pumpkin crafts and decorated treat bags, showing off their creativity and excitement. It's been a fun-filled time of learning and confidence-building! Such budding stars in the Playgroup class!

IN EYFS...



NURSERY

Welcome to the second half term! Our **Nursery** children have kicked off their new theme, "Places in My Community," with lots of excitement and curiosity. They began with a story time featuring "Post Office Rush" and a delightful pretend visit to the Post Office with Omo Berry. The children learnt new vocabulary such as "mail carrier," "mailbox," "postcard" and "official stamp." They had fun writing pretend letters to their favourite people about the wonderful Halloween celebration before posting them in our classroom "Post Office." In Science, they conducted an engaging experiment to discover how to pick up ice using a string — a hands-on activity that encouraged observation and critical thinking. During Phonics, the focus was on the /n/ sound — n n n net, necklace, nap — with lots of listening, sound identification and letter formation practice.

Mathematics lessons were filled with activities to strengthen number recognition, counting skills, and understanding of quantities. To end the week on a festive note, the children dressed up in spooky Halloween costumes, crafted their own pumpkin bags and enjoyed a lively trick-ortreat session.

The **Reception** class returned from the half-term break full of energy, kicking off with their first Open Morning of the academic year. They confidently showcased all they had learnt through narrations and demonstrations, impressing everyone with their recall and enthusiasm.

In Maths, the children explored circles and triangles, identifying them in their surroundings, drawing, labelling and using the shapes to create colourful 2D designs. In Literacy, the theme "All About Me" continued with a focus on Families, inspired by The Great Big Book of Families. The children discovered that families come in all shapes and sizes, united by love and care. They expressed this beautifully through drawings and art pieces of their own families.

In Understanding the World, they celebrated Halloween and Bonfire Night with themed crafts and lively discussions. Daily phonics and handwriting sessions continue to strengthen their literacy foundation, while PE and swimming kept spirits high and bodies active.

It's been a bright and joyful start to the half term — well done, Reception!





IN KS 1...

YEAR 1

The past two weeks in **Year 1** have been a wonderful blend of learning and celebration! Our young learners explored the festival of Diwali, crafting beautiful diyas and discovering its meaning. They also enjoyed the spooky excitement of Halloween, using their maths skills to colour cheerful pumpkins by following a times-table colour code — learning made festive and fun! In Literacy, pupils strengthened their grammar and comprehension by identifying five verbs and five nouns from their favourite storybooks. Geography took a playful twist as they learnt the cardinal directions — North, South, East and West — and used them in a lively treasure-hunt challenge around the classroom. They rounded up on a musical note, as the children began rehearsing Christmas songs with plenty of joy and festive cheer. 47*






Happy Hearts, Bright Minds II

YEAR 2



Out To Discover

Strengthening number operations and logical reasoning; Exploring rhythm, expression and creativity through poetry; Understanding correct punctuation and grammar in writing.



The busy bees are back in! In Maths, we practised adding and subtracting 2-digit numbers, finding missing parts in models and solving sums with three 1-digit numbers — strengthening our problem-solving and number-sense skills. In Literacy, the children explored the features of poems, reading and writing their own imaginative verses filled with rhythm and feeling. Grammar lessons focused on using punctuation correctly and learning about collective nouns like a flock of birds or a bunch of grapes. For Spelling, we tackled the /n/ sound spelt with 'kn' and 'gn' in words like knife and gnaw. In History, we travelled to ancient Egypt to explore the fascinating Pyramid of Giza, while in Science, we studied the food chain and how energy flows between living things. It's been all full on learning and development at the hive!



IN KS 2&3...

SCIENCE

It's been a week of exciting discoveries in Science! **Year 3** explored infiltration rates by testing which soil types let water soak through fastest, repeating their experiment to ensure a fair test. In **Year 4**, pupils investigated the states of matter, timing how quickly different-sized ice cubes melted — learning that smaller ones melt faster!


Year 5 became young chemists as they separated a mixture of salt, clay, and water through filtering and evaporation, proudly revealing sparkling salt crystals. **Year 6** explored elements and compounds, learning how atoms form molecules and taking their first steps into the world of the Periodic Table.

Meanwhile, Years 7 and 8 revisited Solutions and Suspensions, preparing for practical experiments to separate mixtures in the lab. It has been truly hands-on for our young scientists! \Rightarrow



MATHS

In Maths, our pupils have been building strong skills through fun and challenging lessons. Year 3 mastered addition and subtraction, confidently solving problems with 2- and 3-digit numbers. Year 4 became "Area Adventurers," learning to measure, create and compare 2D shapes. Year 5 explored multiples, factors and special numbers like primes and squares while practising quick calculations with 10s, 100s and 1,000s. Year 6 tackled fractions as they simplified, compared and calculated them with growing confidence. Year 7 strengthened number fluency through rounding, comparing and ordering integers and decimals, while Year 8 tackled complex fractions and algebra challenges — mastering the magic of reciprocals along the way. These maths geniuses are taking over the






ENGLISH



It's been an exciting fortnight in English as pupils across all year groups strengthened their writing and language skills. Year 3 explored pre'positions and conjunctions, using words like "under," "between" 'and' and 'because' to build clearer, more interesting sentences. Year 4 learnt how adverbials and verb tenses bring stories to life, confidently using time phrases such as "Before sunrise" and ensuring their writing stayed in the right tense. Year 5 discovered adverbs of possibility like "probably" and "surely" while improving reading comprehension through discussion and inference. Year 6 focused on vocabulary and perfect verb forms, polishing their grammar and comprehension skills in preparation for SATs. In Years 7 and 8, pupils worked on varying sentence starters and using determiners for precision, producing more engaging and well-structured writing.
